

BENGALURU THANKS ITS GOOD SAMARITANS

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According to the Global Road Safety Report, 2015, India witnesses more than 200,000 deaths due to Road Traffic Accidents (RTAs). In such a scenario, the first person to attend a victim is a traffic bystander. Good Samaritan's initiative is to strengthen the cause by encouraging common people to help so that the victim could be taken to the nearest hospital without hassle.

In a one of its kind initiative, Good Samaritans awards were given to three people and nine were felicitated (in the individual category) for helping accident victims, getting medical help and saving their lives. Awards were also given to Organizations, who have worked towards improving road safety. This is the first annual property of Columbia Asia Hospitals.

“The Good Samaritan guidelines are encouraging people to come forward and help the victims without any fear of being subjected to any criminal or civil liability. However, not many are aware of these guidelines. Being in the healthcare industry, we thought of taking a proactive step in ensuring that less lives are lost in RTA. Good Samaritan Awards is our first attempt towards this,” said Tufan Ghosh, CEO Columbia Asia Hospitals.

Ramalinga Reddy, Minister for Transport, Govt of Karnataka, gave insights on the road accidents, and how people can help each other in any emergency situation and bring a positive change in the society.

During the panel discussion R Hithendra, Additional Commissioner of Police (Traffic), Bengaluru talked about how road traffic accidents are a major concern in Bangalore.

He stressed upon the fact that the Good Samaritan will be helped by the police.

In India, one life is lost in RTA every four minutes. Thus, on an average 377 people, including 16 children, die of RTA every day.

C J Kaveriamma : On her way to Coorg, this lady saw that huge crowd has gathered around an accident spot. After reaching there she found that the driver, an old lady and a child are seriously injured after meeting with an accident. She dropped her plans of visiting Coorg and carried the accident victims to the hospital. During the journey to the hospital, she constantly made them drink water to reduce blood loss.
